1	Max brought a nice energy and enthusiasm to Evan throughout the show and seemed very confident on stage. He had nice emotional reactions to moments throughout, especially in moments like the punch and the kiss. When singing in his mid-range, he had good power and tone. He carried a lot of physical tension in his jaw and his neck while singing, so working to relax all of those areas and use his diaphragm to support the tone his upper range will gain the same sort of power. His tone would sometimes start falling flat; larger breaths will help support the notes. Evan sings a lot of things straight to the audience and Max handled that direct address well. There's a tendency to use hands and head movements to try to convey the urgency of those emotions and to punctuate ideas, but it's better to use those gestures sparingly. Using them too often gives everything the same weight and can fatigue an audience. Give them a moment to focus on what you're saying/singing without movement will more easily pull them along in the story.	11/25/2015 1:19 PM
2	Great energy on stage! Diction was clear both speaking and singing. However, when singing be sure to have clear consonant releases. Know the difference between an unvoiced consonant (T, K, S, etc.) and voiced consonant (D,G, N, etc.). Also, when approaching your higher register, work for a low, properly engaged breath and avoid tension in the chin/neck to avoid straining. Stage presence was strong. When delivering material towards the audience look out, towards the back of the auditorium. Your body language was very convincing but more facial expression and open eyes, looking out could be used. The character truly evolved and had an obvious arc. Be sure to always be engaged in the scene even when you are not front and center. 3	The character was consistent throughout. Vocal and physical traits of a 13 year old were not as strong of a representation of a boy just entering his teenage years as they needed to be. More emotional awkwardness would have been appropriate for the character of Evan. The ensemble overall seemed more like high school students than middle school/junior high students. Your singing was melodically and rhythmically accurate with minor errors. Your projection was very audible and the diction was clear and clean. You moved purposefully and pretty naturally. 

At times, character focus was lacking because of late stage entrances, forgotten text, or disengaging when "Patrice" wasn't front and center. Acting is Reacting at all times when on stage. It is important to listen and react to what is going on as it is the first time you ever heard it. Vocally the melody was evident. However, it was evident that breath support/control is an area to work on. Work with your teacher to discover proper breathing technique and how to manage your breath to create a longer phrase, as you cut longer notes off early. Also, give attention to projection. As in theater, often something goes wrong and the show must go on. If the mics are not on you must increase your projection so that the audience can hear you. Work hard outside of rehearsals to work on the music and lean on those students who are strong singers. We are all better when we work together. There were great moments where the company was engaged in the plot (especially in Any Minute). However, throughout the show it is vital that you are engaged in the action visually and emotionally. 





During those tempo changes the band did a great job of recovery. It might be helpful to have stage monitors facing the performers. Regarding professionalism, most of the band members were dressed in black but they weren't all professionally dressed, some were in jeans. However, that might not be much of an issue because of the genre/time period of the production. Just minutes before the show was to start members were on cell phones.
